
Psychology: 2021 library research guide

- I. The library homepage.
 - A. **Subject guides** for each academic discipline.
 - B. Quick Search menu: for books, articles, videos etc.
 - C. Course reserves. Books made available for your class by your instructor.
 - D. Databases A-Z. Full listing of all the databases available through the library.
 - E. Ask a Librarian Reference services via email.
 - F. **Encyclopedia Britannica** and other key resources available directly from the home page.




- A. Credo Online Reference collection: Database of reference works
 - Over 900 reference works (many on psychology) and topic pages covering a wide range of subjects.
 - Links to database articles on similar topics.
- B. Circulating collection
 - 1. Over 100,000 books, and over 200,000 ebooks.
 - 2. Borrowing privileges with student ID & barcode.


IV. The online catalog.

- A. Lists both books and ebooks available.
 - 1. Either a link to the full text for ebooks, or a Call Number for print books will be provided.



- A. Click the **subject Guides** link on the library homepage.
- B. Select Psychology from the list of academic disciplines listed on the page.
 - 1. Top: Online Encyclopedias lists the most authoritative reference sources, like Corsini Encyclopedia of Psychology.
 - 2. Top Right: Citing sources. APA guide and Zotero, an online citation manager and bibliography generator.
 - 3. Center Left: Databases: PsycINFO; PsycARTICLES
 - 4. Right Center: Searching and retrieving books, Inter-library loan.
 - 5. Below: Streaming video and Websites for psychology.






Ouick Search Menu


V. Databases

- A. **PsycINFO**: Premier database for psychology with links to full text.
 - 1. Search other databases such *PsycARTICLES* simultaneously.
 - 2. Select the search you want to do (subject, keyword etc.). Click search.
 - a. Use asterisk (*) as a wildcard for other letters (i.e.: teen* = teens, teenage, etc.)
 - b. Use quotes ("") to search terms as a phrase (i.e.: "drug abuse")
 - c. Limit results to a specific data range, or to peer reviewed articles.
 - d. Other databases to try: ProQuest; Science Direct.



A. If full text is not provided in the database you are in, but is available in another database, the OCLC Link Resolver link 5 included


1. This will take you to the article, when available.
